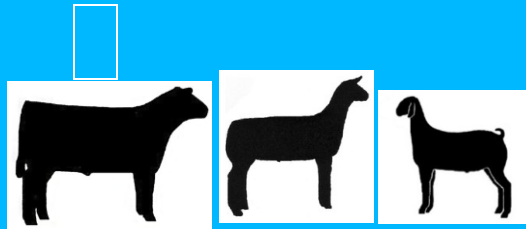

Expenses

Keeping good **feed records** is important. Good records show what kind of feed you used for your project and how much it cost. You can enter feed expenses when you buy feed. Home-raised feeds should be valued at market price – what it can be sold for. At the end of your project, total how much feed you used and how much it cost. Even if feed is donated by family or business you will still need to write the fair market value.
